# Plants to be on the Look Out for: Skunk Cabbage

Skunk Cabbage (Symplocarpus foetidus)


Skunk Cabbage is our first spring wild flower even though you typically don't think of February as spring. You will see it growing in wet swampy places, near creeks, or in wetland areas. Skunk cabbage blooms long before any other spring wildflower. You can usually find it flowering in February while there is still snow on the ground. The flower actually generates enough heat to melt the snow around the base of the plant. Close up this plant stinks, but there is a good reason for that smell. Its bad odor attracts bees, flies and gnats which help to pollinate it.

Skunk cabbage is a perennial with large, 1 to 2 foot broad oval leaves. Instead of having flower petals, the flower is a single leaf-like looking sheath called a "spathe." The leaf is hood-shaped and dark maroon streaked with greenish-yellow. The spathe protects the "spadix," which is a fleshy club-shaped spike. The spadix looks fuzzy because it is crowded with tiny flowers with no petals. The flower is low to the ground but is fairly easy to spot because the plant flowers before its leaves appear. Later, large leaves emerge and grow to the size of rhubarb leaves.

The Native Americans used this plant medicinally for cramps, convulsions, as a root poultice for wounds, and as an under arm deodorant. Later, physicians also used it as an antispasmodic for epileptic seizures, for asthma, and coughs among other remedies. But, be advised, you should not eat any part of this plant at any stage of its growth. It is considered toxic, especially the roots. If the leaves are ingested it will cause considerable burning and inflammation that will not be eliminated by drinking water. According to folklore, the roots will loose their toxicity if allowed to dry for over six months. But I do not recommend that anyone eat the dried root. This is definitely a plant to admire, not to ingest!

Get out this month to see the skunk cabbage flower. It is worth the trip.
