Tammie Robinson Will Be 2020'S Evergreen Award Recipient

At its May 7th meeting Evergreen Conservancy's board voted to make Tammie Robinson our 2020 Evergreen Award recipient. Many of you are familiar with Tammie from the Conservation District and the annual Envirothon. Tammie was nominated by Douglas Beri, District Manager of the Indiana County Conservation District.

Tammie has been the office administrator at the conservation district for more than 35 years. Mr. Beri noted that "she has held the district together through three and half decades of changes and progress. Her passion and dedication to environmental conservation over the years has proven to be an invaluable resource for the district and Indiana County as a whole."

However it is Tammie's involvement with the Indiana County Envirothon that is extraordinary. Since the start of the Envirothon in 1987 Tammie has been the cornerstone in making it a yearly success. She was instrumental in starting a junior high Envirothon in 1999. She helps raise money to support a scholarship fund for participants that has raised \$21,500. In this extraordinary year because of the pandemic she organized a "virtual Envirothon".

Conservancy members recall that the presentation of the Evergreen Award has been a feature of our annual membership meeting since 2010. However because of COVID-19 it has been necessary to postpone our annual meeting. Tammie Robinson will be presented with the 2020 Evergreen Award at some future public event.


Grant News



Datalogger Download Help Needed

If you are interested in helping us do data logger downloads let us know at evergreenconservancy@gmail.com. We have a route of three locations in town that we need volunteers to help out with. Each route should take about 1 to 2 hours to do every two to three weeks. That is only about 2-4 hours a month and gets you in the outdoors on a creek. If you have a laptop you can use we will give you the software and a reader to use. If you do not have a laptop we can supply you with one. We will go with you the first few times to show you how to do the downloads till you are comfortable doing the them. It is simple once you learn the steps. You just download the data and then send it to Cindy via email. So, if you think you might be able to help us out – please let us know. Thanks!

Bags to Benches

Evergreen Conservancy with our partner LWV environmental committee began a 6 month collection of plastic which we turn into our local Giant Eagle who ships it to Trex. When we get 500 pounds of plastic Trex will make a bench for us and ship

We started out with a bang and in 2 months had collected almost 300 pounds of plastic. Then the COVID virus hit and all of our bin locations closed. However Chevy Chase is still collecting plastic for us through their lunch program and as of May first we have logged 350 pounds of plastic. We still have till August to meet our 500 pounds. Keep saving plastic for us! We will be able to collect it at some point and turn it in. That keeps all that plastic out of the landfills! Even when our collection ends we plan on another organization continuing it, so we will just keep on collecting plastic. Just as a reminder the type of plastic to save is clean and dry film plastic. For example, grocery bags, saran, wraps on newspapers, the plastic that covers paper towels and toilet paper, any type of soft plastic. Unfortunately we cannot accept bottles or hard plastic containers. Thanks for your support so far and keep collecting your plastic! If you do collect, weigh and take it to GE yourself – let us know and we can count it into our total. The YMCA has put the bin outside the front doors under the roof if you want to drop plastic out there you still can. Contact Cindy if you have any questions at evergreenconservancy@gmail.com.

Birding in Indiana County

A great birding hotspot in Indiana County is Yellow Creek State Park. They have a large diversity of bird populations throughout the various habitats of the state park. They also have a waterfowl observatory trail with a wetland walkway and wild-life blind to provide a different viewing perspective and opportunity to see waterfowl. On the State Park's web page, they have a PDF of a park bird list. Some other hotspots in Indiana County are Blue Spruce Park and Conemaugh River lake. The birds that have been found in Indiana can be viewed (and recorded) on ebird.org.

The prime time to bird watch is during migration, which occurs in the spring and fall. Birds are leaving, returning, and even passing through. It is a great way to observe birds that typically are not local and from a different region. Specifically, May is a good time to view birds as they are brighter than usual with their mating plumage and vocal with territorial and mating calls.

A bird of focus, simply chosen by a nice picture captured on a trail at Yellow Creek State Park, is the Baltimore Oriole (Icterus galbula). The males are eye catching with the bright orange to black plumage with white accents. Females (and immature males) have a dull yellow/orange, gray, and white plumage. These robin sized birds forage for flowers, fruits, and insects. Their pointy bills are used particularly for nectaring and also gaping, where they stab the fruit with their closed bill, then open to make a gash to drink the juice from. Baltimore Orioles can be found during their breeding season in open woodlands, forest edge, river banks, and small groves of trees. They can also be lured into residential areas when they are provided nectar resources like oranges, jams, or sugar water. They build hanging woven nests high in tall trees.

To learn additional information about Pennsylvania birds, go to <u>pa.audubon.org</u>. They provide a list of bird species found in PA with their song/call recordings. They also have a video to help identify common backyard birds.
